## A WORD TO THE WISE RABBI JAY H. ROSENBAUM

### “A SPIRITUAL PRESCRIPTION FOR A NEW SEASON A NEW REALITY TO STAY HEALTHY, STAY SAFE, STAY CONNECTED TO EACH OTHER AND GOD”

Dear friends,

This has been a most trying and indeed tragic time for our Nation, the world and many of our families at Temple Israel. Though it appears we have turned the corner and the Covid Blitzkrieg of WW111 of the past months has, and at least for now, slowed down and many states and communities are opening up. For many, the quarantine is a thing of the past, but the war is far from over. Now, while restrictions on travel and gatherings have somewhat been relaxed, we must not be lax with the precautions we take to keep ourselves, our families and community safe. And so, to begin, let us follow the Sage advice of the Torah found in Psalm 146, “Put not your trust in Princes nor the Son of Man”. Tragically, in our age of social media, what is called fake news and a Nation divided as it has never been since the Vietnam War, more than ever it is necessary to rely on your own intellect and sense of right and wrong rather than what any governor, political pundit our elected official of high station professes, wears, or predicts about today or tomorrow. Remember, in the main a Politicians job, no matter the party, is to play to his or her base to get reelected.

Furthermore, their analysis’s as to what is safe and what is not, is at best a calculated guess. For example, in Germany, when they began opening parts of society after the lock down including opening houses of worship, feeling they brought the virus under control, even after following all the rules the leader of a Hesse Baptist Church reported, that 40 churchgoers tested positive for Covid 19 and six were hospitalized. While President Trump is correct that worshipping is an essential service it need not according to any of the Abrahamic faiths to take place in a house of worship. If you question this, just ask yourself what is the holiest destination of worship in Judaism? We all know the answer, it Is the Western Wall in Jerusalem, where so many of us have offered our prayers, left our notes postmarked to the Almighty and shed tears of joy and hope.

Furthermore, the Torah teaches us, that the most sacred of Temples are human beings, the Holy’s crowning act of creation. We see this in the opening verses of the book of Genesis where we read that God petitions the angels in heaven and proclaims, “let us make man in our image after our likeness. And God created man in his image, in the image of God he created him; Male and female he created them”. The message here is clear, that God is with us and in us where ever we seek our Creator. Yes, the spiritual experience of worship in our magnificent sanctuary is powerful and in truth transcends words. We will return to our spiritual home and house of God when and in a fashion that is safe and prescribed by the CDC and the world of science. Yes, like each and every one of us I look forward to joining you in prayer at our Temple Israel, in our sanctuary unsurpassed in beauty and majesty. But until that day comes, let us continue to celebrate the Shabbat and the Holy Days as we have these past month's through the gift of modern technology and social media. The prayers we recite, the hymns we sing, all offerings of the heart to the Almighty remind us that we are not alone, that we are never distant from God, that while physically distant from each other we are emotionally and spiritually connected to one another. In this way we gain the emotional sustenance our souls need and yearn for; in this way we find strength, courage and hope as we give thanks for the gifts of life, love, friendship, and a supportive community and that which sustains our bodies and souls.

Now, since human life is sacred and the imperative of “pekuach nefesh” of protecting our lives is a divine commandment we are required to follow best practice as prescribed by the worlds of science and medicine in this time of the Covid 19 virus. To this end, logic and reason dictates that we follow the same precautionary measures in this new season when for many of us, we are no longer expected to shelter in place to the same extent as in the past. This being said. out of respect for the welfare of others and

concern for our own welfare, let us continue to practice social distancing and wear masks while in public in accordance with the guidelines of the CDC. Furthermore, as a rabbi who prides himself on his knowledge of Torah and who's main focus is to be there for you, the members of my Temple Israel family in your times of need, sorrow and joy, I also consider myself a rabbinic fashionista. That being said, I consider the face mask in all its manifestations, the new must-have addition to our wardrobes and the ultimate fashion statement always to be worn in public as circumstances dictate. Finally, my spiritual prescription for this new season and new reality we face, is to cherish the time-tested relationships we have developed in every aspect of our lives as we go forward with a new appreciation for all the blessings in our lives, among them the people we can rely on, that we can count on to be there for us. This is the first lesson I learned as an Army Chaplain who served during the Vietnam War, from the combat veterans I ministered to. Indeed, my friends, together we have become combat veterans in these last month. Like the movie of some years ago, we have become a band of brothers and sisters and may we always remain so.

And so my dear friends, you the precious members of my Temple Israel family, as we go forward together to meet the challenges and the opportunities we will encounter in this new season, this new reality, please consider the spiritual prescription to stay healthy-to stay safe I offer you from heart to heart. Please know that you're in my prayers every day as we stay connected to each other and to God. May Almighty God, Master of the Universe, Creator of all, watch over us, our family members and loved ones, that together we may celebrate the New Year, 5781 with good health as the year of Chaim Tovim of goodness and life, a year of peace free of this pandemic for all your children everywhere. Amen!

While this has been a challenging year, it has also been a year of personal, spiritual, and intellectual growth. Our virtual classes and Shabbat and Holiday Services that we have shared enriched our lives, brought us closer to one another and uplifted our spirits. I am proud of you. ### **Easy Gazpacho**

Prep Time: 15 mins.    Chill Time 3 hours +    Total Time: 3 hours + 15 mins.    Serves 5

#### **Ingredients**

2 cups tomato juice or (V-8)  
 4 medium tomatoes,  
 peeled, and finely chopped  
 ½ cup peeled, seeded,  
 chopped cucumber  
 1/3 cup finely chopped onion  
 1/3 cup seeded, chopped bell  
 Pepper  
 ¼ cup olive oil  
 ¼ cup cider vinegar  
 1 teaspoon sugar  
 1 garlic clove, minced (more is good)  
 ¼ teaspoon salt  
 ¼ teaspoon pepper

#### **Directions**

**Really lazy method**, combine all ingredients. Cover and refrigerate until chilled, at least 4 hours.  
**Less lazy method**, put in a food processor and then chill.  
 You can take a slice or two of bread, soak it in water and add it to soup.
